




Initial ELPAC





What is Reclassification?

This is the process that identifies English Learners who are ready to participate in regular instruction without further English Learner program assistance.



Reclassification Criteria

 English Language Proficiency Assessments (ELPAC): Overall ELPAC <u>scale score of Level</u> <u>4</u> (Well Developed).



Assessments of Basic Skills: a. Level 3 (Standard Met) <u>Scale Score</u> on the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC) ELA/Literacy Assessment.



Students without a SBAC score must have a Reading Inventory (RI) score of at least the lowest score within the the grade level Proficient range as well as a passing score (2+) on the District Writing Benchmark (DWB).



- 3. Teacher recommendation:
 - a. Grade of C or higher in all core academic classes
 - b. Positive teacher feedback on district Teacher Recommendation form
