### <u>Math Diagnostic Testing Project</u> (MDTP – All Students):

- -The assessment will help us determine whether students are ready for grade-level math. Students will take this assessment in their 6<sup>th</sup> grade class during the months of March or April.
- Approximately 45 minutes timed test
- 40 questions

## Integrated Math B Honors Readiness Test (IMBHRT - Optional):

- Grade skip (8<sup>th</sup> grade honors curriculum)
- Must pass with a 70% or higher



## Independent Study P.E.

#### What is ISPE?

- Designed for high ranking athletes who compete as an individual at the regional, state, and/or national level in specified sports.
- An independent study course requiring personal accountability and maturity.
- The direct instruction requirement must meet or exceed 400 minutes every 10 school days/2 weeks (State of California P.E. statute)
- ISPE is year-long class in SDUHSD middle schools






### SDUHSD Welcome Letter

- All current 6<sup>th</sup> grade students will need to submit online enrollment for their designated boundary school of attendance.
- Your student's designated boundary school is based on where you reside, not on which elementary school your student attends.
- The deadline to submit online enrollment is February 21, 2020. Not submitting online enrollment by this deadline will delay the enrollment process and online course selection.
- Your confirmation page and required supporting materials will need to be printed, signed, and submitted to your boundary middle school by February 28th. \*\*Drop off at PTMS as early as 2/13.



- Select Course Requests Entry. The Course Requests Entry page can be accessed from the Classes dropdown.





#### For Students

For Parents

#### Establish Connection:

- Quality time with family and friends is directly related to your emotional well-being and builds trusting relationships.
- Connecting with trusted adults helps build communication skills and is tied to making healthy choices; two essential skills that help foster positive relationships.

Develop Awareness:

- Explore personal interests beginning in middle school; connect interests with the courses you select and extracurricular activities in which you choose to participate.
- Broaden post-high school plans to include multiple options related to education and
- Do not compare yourself to others; You are each unique and have your own interests and strengths.

Take Responsibility:

- Be responsible for choosing what school experience you want to have; it is not just about the end result, but also the journey along the way.
- Be mindful and choose courses wisely; time availability, interests, physical and emotional well-being should all be taken into consideration.

Extend your Reach!

- Communicate your needs and concerns and let others help you; by doing so you are building resources and a support system.
- Asking questions and listening can help broaden your perspective and toolbox of skills that lead to long-term success.

#### Establish Connection:

- Encourage time with family and friends to build student self-worth and emotional well-being.
- Model and teach self-advocacy (verbal communication) and self-care (healthy choices).

- Requirements for K-12 admission also apply to transfer pupils.
- Combination vaccines (e.g., MMRV) meet the requirements for individual component vaccines. Doses of DTP count towards the DTaP requirement.
- 3. Any vaccine administered four or fewer days prior to the minimum required age is valid.
- 4. Three doses of polio vaccine meet the requirement if one dose was given on or after the 4th birthday.
- 5. Four doses of DTaP meet the requirement if at least one dose was given on or after the 4th birthday. Three doses meet the requirement if at least one dose of Tdap, DTaP, or DTP vaccine was given on or after the 7th birthday (also meets the 7th-12th grade Tdap requirement. See fn. 8.)

- One or two doses of Td vaccine given on or after the 7th birthday count towards the K-12 requirement.
- 6. For 7th grade admission, refer to Health and Safety Code section 120335, subdivision (c).
- 7. Two doses of measles, two doses of mumps, and one dose of rubella vaccine meet the requirement, separately or combined. Only doses administered on or after the 1st birthday meet the requirement.
- 8. For 7th-12th graders, at least one dose of pertussis-containing vaccine is required on or after the 7th birthday.
- For children in ungraded schools, pupils 12 years and older are subject to the 7th grade advancement requirements.
- 10. The varicella requirement for seventh grade advancement expires after June 30, 2025.

DTaP/Tdap = diphtheria toxoid, tetanus toxoid, and acellular pertussis vaccine Hep B = hepatitis B vaccine MMR = measles, mumps, and rubella vaccine Varicella = chickenpox vaccine
